2016-2017 Annual Report October 2017



#### **MESSAGE FROM SCHOOL PRINCIPAL**

Developing this year's School Annual Results Report involved stakeholders examining data to look for trends, successes and next steps. Examining all the data resulted in many affirmations of what we as a school community are doing and the positive impact of the strategies we have employed.

As a relatively new school, we have worked hard to create a positive learning environment for all students by focusing on continuous school improvement. We have been purposeful in our communication with parents, worked to develop unique ways to engage stakeholders, helped students develop positive citizenship skills, explored how school relates to the world of work and created safe and caring learning spaces. The results of these efforts are evident in the APORI survey results. In looking at this data over the past 3 school years, we note significant improvement year over year.

Literacy has been a primary focus and the results our students are achieving are a testament to the success of the strategies teachers are using to support all learners. In carefully examining the data for language arts, we noted that our English Language Learners (ELL) and Special Education students scored above the provincial average at grade 6 as did our regular program students. In addition, 100% of ELL students enrolled in French immersion achieved acceptable on French language arts. Our grade 6 French immersion students also scored on par with the province for the percentage of students achieving acceptable. Results in math and social studies also increased over the previous year. At the grade 9 level, more regular program students achieved acceptable than at the provincial level. As students progress from grade 6 to grade 9, we noted that many of our English students continue to perform well in language arts, science and social studies. In all these subjects, we were at or above provincial levels for the acceptable level.

As we move forward this year, we will continue to focus on literacy and supporting all learners. This will be done by building on the success we have made over the previous years. We will continue to provide teachers with elbow-to-elbow support, utilize student assessment data to guide instruction, and focus on implementing the exceptional practices outlined in the divisional literacy framework. Attention will also be paid to supporting English language learners as they move from elementary to middle school. As these students move through the grades, we will focus on ways to assist them in acquiring and understanding content specific vocabulary.

In addition to a literacy focus, we are targeting numeracy skills. Similar to literacy we will support teachers as they develop and refine numeracy pedagogy, help students understand numeracy concepts and develop computation fluency, and support student development of problem-solving skills. Educational resources related to exemplary math practices will be identified and purchased with instructional coaching time dedicated to supporting teachers in using them effectively with their students. Assessment data will be used to provide students with targeted instruction in a small group setting when needed. We will also provide numeracy evenings for parents where they can learn how to support their children in mathematics.

While we are pleased with many of the results we have obtained in the last three years, we are no way complacent in our efforts to continue to make our school a great place for students, staff, parents and the community. We will continue to use data to inform practices that take place in the school. While we see growth in student achievement over time, we continue to look for ways to challenge our students to achieve excellence. As students move from elementary to middle school, we understand the importance of ensuring all students develop the content area vocabulary and knowledge necessary for success. This is particularly important for our ELL students and students in special programs.

#### **OVERVIEW OF ACHIEVEMENTS**

#### Goal One - Learners are successful.

Literacy Framework. Ensuring learners are successful starts with working to ensure all children become literate. Traditionally supporting students to become literate focused on developing reading and writing skills. Recently, however, the definition of what it means to be literate has grown to include supporting students to develop the "ability, confidence and willingness to engage with language to acquire, construct and communicate meaning in all aspects of daily living" (Alberta Education). Supporting students to develop competent literacy skills continues to be a primary focus.

In the past year, teachers have delved into current research proven instructional best practices related to literacy. Primary teachers worked closely with divisional learning specialists to explore assessment practices, identify effective practices, and develop lessons tailored to the needs of students. At the intermediate level, teachers attended multiple professional learning opportunities, used assessment data to guide instruction and worked collegially to plan lessons designed to support student growth. Middle level teachers worked with school based learning coaches to explore literacy across content areas. These teachers developed lessons that reflected current best practice and were designed to push student thinking forward.

The impact of the work we have done in relation to literacy is evident in our most recent provincial achievement test data. Grade 6 student acceptable scores improved this year over last with our scores above the provincial average. In addition, our achievement in the area of excellence improved by more than 4%. The effectiveness of our literacy practices is also evident in the scores of English language learners (ELL) and special education students. In total, 90.9% of our ELL students scored above the acceptable level at grade 6 which is almost 3% higher than the provincial average. In addition, 80% of students designated as special education scored in the acceptable range also above the provincial average. At the grade 9 level, our students showed improvement over the previous year with 80.9% of these students achieving the acceptable level -4% above the provincial average. The number of students achieving excellence also improved.

#### Goal Two - Learners are engaged.

**Parent Communication.** Developing effective ways to communicate with parents continued to be a focus last year. While many of the forms of communication such as monthly newsletters, emails, and phone calls continued, we added several new formats for helping to ensure the school community remained informed. Teachers leveraged unique ways to share what was happening in their classes with all their parents. These included classroom blogs, using apps such as *Bloomz* and *Remind*, monthly newsletters and emails. In total, teachers sent out over 400 whole class bulletins to parents. These documents were rich in information related to curriculum, student activities and upcoming events. Parents indicated one of their favorite aspects of the weekly communications was the pictures many of the teachers included.

At the school level, we continued to send out monthly newsletters, talk to parents both informally and formally, and work collaboratively with our school council. In order to provide a venue for more formalized conversations with parents, we added monthly Fireside Chats with administration. These events followed our monthly Family Breakfasts and were designed to provide parents with a forum for sharing ideas, expressing concerns and supporting the school. Feedback from parents who participated in these discussions was positive. They enjoyed the opportunity to get to know the school administration and felt the conversations were proactive. The success of these initiatives is evident in that 79% of decided parents are satisfied we build positive relationships with them. Moving forward this year, our goal is to increase the attendance at events by developing clear messaging with regards to dates, times and purpose.

**CTF Program.** Over the past year, staff explored the new Career and Technology Foundations Program of Studies and created option courses that connected to student interests, developed literacy and numeracy skills through an occupational lens, and provided students with opportunities to develop skills and

knowledge related to the CTF occupational clusters. Students were an integral part of this process and were surveyed about their interests, passions, and occupational goals for the future. Our Middle School students were also involved in career planning through the use of MyBluePrint. This program was used to help students explore themselves as learners, seek out course options for high school and post-secondary education, and discover career paths for the future.

By involving our students in CTF program planning and giving them opportunities to plan for the future, we saw some significant increases in a few key areas of our RVS School Satisfaction Survey and APORI data. 20% more of our students accessed information regarding university and post-secondary education, 16% more students felt that our school helped them plan for their future after school, and 9% more felt they were involved in decisions that affect student life. The Work Preparation area in our APORI data increased by 24%. These results show that our purposeful work in involving students in decision making and planning are having a positive result in engaging them as learners.

#### Goal Three – Learners are supported.

Safe and Caring. Our school community was involved in a number of initiatives to help our students feel supported. Staff received a full day of training related to Mental Health and a variety of school programs (Caring Tails, Stepping Stones for Mental Health Presentations, Girls Groups, Friends for Life, Second Step, etc.) were implemented as a way to provide positive mental health supports to our students. Our Child Development Advisor ran daily recess buddy groups for many of our elementary students and provided them with opportunities for leadership as they ran games and activities for all students. Our middle school Leadership students planned and delivered leadership assemblies each month promoting the 7 Habits of Highly Successful People by Stephen Covey and ran a variety of school culture building Spirit Days. Lastly, staff created a welcoming environment by meeting students at the class doors each day.

Our student data, although comparable to our previous year, indicates that we need to continue to focus on creating a safe and welcoming environment for students. Students feel that staff care about them at school, but it is clear that our students want us to focus more specifically on building peer relationships. Approximately 75% of our parents surveyed in the RVS School Satisfaction Survey feel that students are safe, care for each other, and develop respectful relationships with staff. 89% of our staff feel that there is a caring atmosphere in school, which is an 11% increase from the previous year. Our APORI data shows improvement in both the Safe and Caring Schools area and Citizenship. As a school, we are committed to continuing to build a safe and caring environment and recognize that it is an important component of making learners feel supported.

**Supporting Diverse Learners.** At East Lake, we are dedicated to ensuring the needs of all learners are met. All staff work diligently to find ways to engage students in meaningful activities specific to their learning needs. As a school, we implemented a Response to Intervention (RTI) framework for supporting all learners including our most vulnerable ones. At the elementary level, many teachers received extensive training in literacy intervention. Teachers taking this training learned how to support students struggling with literacy in the regular classroom. In the majority of instances, the needs of students were addressed by their teacher in the class. In a few instances where intensive intervention was required, our learning support team provided small group or one-on-one support.

In addition to the RTI framework, all learners had the opportunity to participate in unique learning opportunities. At the early elementary level, students participated in our first Math Fair. All students in grades k-5 participated in meaningful problem-solving activities where they demonstrated their math competencies. Students in grades 6-9 participated in our first annual Science Fair. For this event, students worked independently on science experiments and shared their results with the school community. Several students from this event went on to participate in the Calgary Science Fair.

The results of these efforts are evident in the APORI survey, where the overall percent of stakeholder satisfaction with access to programs and services increased by over 14%.

#### PRIORITY AREAS FOR FUTURE SCHOOL EDUCATION PLANS

#### Goal One - Learners are successful.

Learners are literate and numerate. Numeracy remains a priority for us. Achievement data indicates a decline in performance at the grade 6 level and a very slight increase at the grade 9 level. In examining the data, the following areas need to be addressed: content area vocabulary development, especially with our English Language Learners, fluidity in number sense (including automaticity of basic math facts), visualization, and competence with multi-step, multi-strand problems. Overarching this is the development of growth mindsets in mathematics with students, teachers and parents.

To address these priorities, we are taking a multi-faceted approach. We will continue to dedicate time to a numeracy department head who will work with teachers to build their capacity through modelling, team planning, in-class coaching and ongoing professional learning. Our numeracy department head will also liaise with the divisional facilitator to ensure we leverage any and all opportunities. Our kindergarten to grade 3 teachers will pilot *Mathology*, a literature-based resource. With this pilot, teachers will engage in professional learning geared to enhancing their confidence and skill in the teaching of mathematics. Our middle school math teachers will continue to work on the digital numeracy initiative started last year. We have partnered with the math consultant from the Calgary Regional Consortium to plan school-based PL, and opportunities will be provided for teachers to participate in professional learning outside the school. We have purchased manipulatives to ensure all students have access to concrete materials so they can "see" the math and be physically involved in creating their understanding. In addition, we are offering three workshops to parents, one per term, to help increase parental understanding and confidence in their children's math journeys.

Students from kindergarten to grade 6 will also participate in our second annual Math Fair in the spring. Rather than simply being a one-off, beginning in term 2, students will engage with problems of the month to develop problem solving skills with multi-faceted, complex problems.

#### Goal Two - Learners are engaged.

**Partnerships enhance and fuel learning**. Creating strong partnerships with our families continues to be a priority. We are committed to refining our communication to ensure parents and caregivers know what is happening at East Lake. Staff provides frequent updates to parents via email, apps such as Bloomz or Remind, the school website and the parent portal. We opened the parent portal to all parents in September so they can access timely information related to their child's achievement. Teachers were provided with professional learning related to sharing achievement information with parents using Power Teacher Pro.

In survey data, parents indicated that building partnerships with the greater community is an area of need. While we work extensively with multiple community partners, we realize this information has not always been shared with parents. To increase understanding of the work we do with the greater community, we are highlighting all the partnerships we have in our monthly newsletters. We are also more active with our social media, ensuring information is delivered in a variety of ways.

We will also hold multiple orientation and information sessions for parents. In May and June, all kindergarten parents will be invited to attend a kindergarten information session. A volunteer orientation session was held in late September to ensure our volunteers are aware of the pertinent policies and procedures. Parent workshops in the areas of literacy and numeracy are also planned. These sessions aim to help parents understand what quality learning looks like, how we support their children to achieve success and how to help their children at home most effectively. It will also be important to provide parents with an understanding of the work students do in class. To this end, showcases of student work will be planned to coincide with each triad conference.

#### Goal Three – Learners are supported.

Learners feel well, safe, valued and respected. Ensuring we continue to build a safe and caring environment at East Lake is essential. An environment where learners feel well, safe, valued and respected establishes the foundation for learning. We have created a Learning and Working Environment committee that will refine our Character Education program and revisit our School Code of Conduct. One key area that surfaced as a need from our students, staff and parents is a clear understanding of the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Competencies. Our Character Education Program this year has been called Leadership in the 21st Century and the work of this program will be directly connected to the 21<sup>st</sup> Century competencies. We will be hosting 6 Leadership assemblies this year that will focus on a number of the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Competencies and the 7 Habits that have been a part of the program since the school opened. Classes will also complete extension activities that will encourage them to take the learning back to the classrooms. Students will also hear more in our assemblies and on the daily announcements about SOAR, our school Code of Conduct. Students will have the opportunity to be recognized through a positive ticketing approach when they are Safe, Organized, Accountable and Respectful (SOAR). We will share these initiatives with our community in our newsletter and through Social Media.

Continuing to create a welcoming environment for students, staff and parents is important for the East Lake community. Staff will be visible in the halls and will greet students at their classroom doors each morning. They will engage in positive ways with all students and promote inclusion through their actions and conversations. Regular, ongoing communication with families through a variety of forms will be the expectation and a team approach will be used when problem solving challenging situations. We will also continue to find meaningful ways to involve parents including various volunteer opportunities, evening presentations on a variety of topics, and more frequent classroom communication. Opportunities for students to join a variety of clubs and to help out as recess buddies will build community and school spirit. Staff will also be recognized monthly for the positive contributions they make to East Lake.
