

Imagine That! 2019 Learning Event Summary Report

Building Resilience in Children, Youth and Ourselves

November 6, 2019 Mount Royal University

Event Summary

The sixth annual Imagine That! learning event was hosted by Calgary and Area Regional Collaborative Service Delivery's Learning Partnerships Committee on Wednesday, November 6, 2019 at Mount Royal University's Ross Glen Hall.

The focus of this year's event was on building resiliency in children and youth and featured keynote speaker Dr. Deborah MacNamara along with a guest appearance from VIVO play ambassadors in the afternoon.

The morning session, Building and Supporting Resilience, focused on cultivating the roots of resilience which have lasting effects on children's and youth's capacity to ensure adversity and overcome anxiety.

The afternoon Helping Children and Youth Thrive session explored the developmental road map to maturity along with the four essential experiences necessary for the unfolding of human potential.

The afternoon also included a 'loose parts' free play session called Mad Gap which was led by Play Ambassadors Serena Moar and Hailey Pewtress from the VIVO Play Project and which provided participants with practical, low cost, creative ways to incorporate resiliency building play as they support and work with children and youth at home, at school and in the community.


Dr. MacNamara closed the day with a reminder of the importance of play, rest, soft hearts and fostering the right relationships.

Response Rate


The Response Rate for the internal email survey was **63/219** or **29 %.** This is <u>below standard</u> <u>parameters</u> for online surveys with internal partners.

Overall


96 % of respondents felt engaged with the information presented and 2 % disagreed




97 % of respondents felt the information presented was relevant




67 % of respondents **took the opportunity to network** with other parents and professionals and **7** % did not






92 % of respondents felt they learned about what we need to work on to ensure that children and youth will flourish and 5% disagreed




90 % of respondents felt they learned about the developmental road map to maturity for parents and professionals who want more than just strategies for handling problem behavior and 3 % disagreed



93 % of respondents felt they learned about the four essential experiences necessary for the unfolding of human potential and 2 % disagreed



83 % of respondents felt they gained new perspectives on working with children, youth, and families and 4 % disagreed



New Insights

New insights identified as a result of this learning session about children and youth included the importance of relationships, how children shut down their feelings, that frustration leads to futility and sadness leads to resilience, that at the root of misbehaviour is an emotional problem, and that children need a way to communicate their feelings and to watch for body language.

Takeaways

Many example of "one thing" participants took away from this year's event were provided including the importance of playing and eating together, the importance of tears, immunizing for stressful experiences through play, playing it out, to remember that children should not work for our love, they should rest in it, and that this is hard work but you will find your way.

Mad Gap (Vivo Play Project) Activity

In response to the statement, "What did you think about the Mad Gap activity and what might you incorporate into your work with children and youth" respondents told us they either loved (or felt uncomfortable with) the activity, however many participants indicated plans to incorporate 'loose parts' play into their work with children and youth. Specific recommendations that came up included having smaller groups and incorporating a trauma informed lens when using this activity.

Topics, Speakers and Themes for Future Learning Events

Recommended speakers included Gabor Mate, Bruce Perry, and faculty from the Neufeld Institute. Most of the suggested topics support the mental health and wellbeing of children and youth and included Adverse Childhood Events, Compassion Fatigue, Executive Functioning, Motivational Interviewing, SOGIE, Suicide, Supporting High Functioning along with non-typical Children and Youth, Trauma, and working with behaviours specific to First Nation Children and Youth when dealing with traumatic events of grief, loss, identity, suicide etc.

Other Feedback

When asked, "what else would you like us to know" many participants told us they felt the day was well organized and acknowledged the work of the planning committee. The venue was well liked with comfortable seating, good sight lines, and ample parking, however we received some feedback that parking was too expensive along with a recommendation that organizers provide directions for additional washrooms including a gender-neutral option. Food proved popular but it was noted that the boxed lunches produced a lot of unnecessary waste which didn't support the paperless approach of this year's event.

Audience (by sector)

219 participants including 8 parents, 129 unique position titles, and representing over 42 organizations attended this year's cross sector learning event. 42 cancellations were processed this year prior to the event and there were 37 no-shows on event day.

Recommendations

Based on feedback from participants and experience gained planning and hosting the 2019 event, the committee recommends:

- Continue to choose engaging speakers who deliver content customized to Calgary and Area, and who provide practical, relevant takeaways for participants as well as helping move forward the work of Calgary and Area RCSD
- Continue to actively incorporate feedback from participants when planning future cross-sector Learning Events such as Imagine That!
- Incorporate environmentally friendly choices for event e.g. e-booklet, catering with minimal waste.
- Include hard copy evaluation sheets at the conference in addition to the e-survey sent post event to increase overall response rate from participants.
