- Enrolment Update
  - September 29<sup>th</sup> completed our snapshot to be provided to Alberta Education
  - We grew by 990 students from September 2021 3.7% growth from last fall
  - Also, saw over 300 students move from online/alternative programs back to traditional schools and reduction of overall space through the Prince of Peace facility no longer being part of RVS resulting in even more pressure on our facilities
  - Vast majority of growth in Airdrie, Cochrane and Chestermere
  - Added some staffing to schools to address high growth areas

- Enrolment Update (continued)
  - Airdrie 92% overall utilization
  - Cochrane area 94% overall utilization
  - Chestermere and region 92% overall utilization
  - Springbank/Bragg Creek 81% overall utilization
  - Crossfield 89% overall utilization
  - Beiseker & Kathyrn area is 61% overall utilization

- Actions to address utilization pressures
  - When government informed RVS that we would not be getting any new modulars this year, nor would they pay to move modulars from one location in RVS to another, RVS paid for and moved modular classrooms to address space needs
  - Intensified the use of some of schools (e.g., George McDougall, Springbank Middle, Bert Church) by renovating spaces to create more classroom/instructional spaces
  - Supporting the Board's Space for Students advocacy efforts
    - Joined Board when they met with Minister of Education
    - Met with Deputy Minister
    - Joined Board for meetings with local governments
    - Develop materials to support advocacy efforts
    - Develop creative solutions to address utilization challenges

- Teaching and Learning
  - Excited to restore focus on this area after 2+ years of pandemic realities
  - Investing in our teachers with professional learning related to new curriculum implementation which is going quite well
  - Began a new assessment cycle at all schools where students have been taking part in brief standardized assessments that give the teacher important information about the child's basic skills that can be used to guide instruction or to provide additional supports if needed. The purpose is to see where they are at in their basic skills and guide us on a path of improvement
  - Digging into data from a variety of sources to guide our actions (workbooks, annual education results report, awaiting PAT/Diploma data still, RVS survey, Ab Ed survey, literacy and numeracy assessment data)

## **Strategic Plan Update**

- Consideration of a divisional strategic plan started in the Fall of 2019 when the Board identified a desire to further examine our role related to strategic governance
- Fast forward to Fall of 2022, and we are now in the home stretch for finalizing and approving the 2022-2026 RVS Strategic Plan
- It is important to the Board that the strategic plan reflects the community voice so thank you for your feedback and input the draft strategic plan comes from feedback received from over 10,000 individuals including parents, staff, students, and community members
- The Board of Trustees believes that high-level strategic planning is an integral component of its governance and leadership roles as it sets the stage for success in advancing the Division's vision of RVS as a world-class learning organization where all students achieve their absolute best

### Alberta School Council Engagement Grant Details

• This grant provides funding to school authorities for each school in order to support school councils fulfilling their legislated responsibilities in the education system and enhancing parent involvement and engagement

#### \$500 per each school council

- All funds must be spent in year received, any unused funds must be returned to Alberta Education
- School councils must report annually to the Board on how the grant was handled and used

#### **ASCE Grant – Guidelines**

- RVS will provide the funding to each school directly
- Funds must not be directed to registered fundraising societies
- The decisions for the use of the funds must be made by the school councils and recorded in council minutes
- Funds are to be used to support school councils in fulfilling their legislated responsibilities and for parent involvement and engagement activities
- Alberta Education has allowed unused funds from the 2021-2022 school year to be carried forward, and combined, with the 2022-2023 funds.

#### Allowable use of Funds

#### Parent engagement activities and projects

- Workshops for parents to increase capacity for school council members;
- Information sessions on how parents can support student learning at home and at school;
- Parent resources and workshops on important topics such as, mental health and wellbeing, cyber bullying, healthy living, etc.;
- Programs to support multi-cultural and Indigenous families including, English language learners and First Nations, Métis and Inuit learners;
- Parent resources and tools in multiple languages;
- Events to engage parents on important local issues;
- Parent engagement in promoting the value of arts;
- Trainer/facilitator costs for the professional development, workshops or sessions associated with the above.

#### Non-Allowable use of Funds

- Entertainment costs, meals, snacks, other food;
- No capital asset purchases;
- Activities that have already taken place;
- Organization memberships or conference fees;
- Fundraising events;
- Prizes or incentives to parents and/or students;
- Payment to school board staff including honoraria, gifts;
- Entertainment activities such as barbeques, volunteer teas, movie nights, dances, concerts or performances, etc.

## **ASCE Grant Use Opportunities**

- Choosing ASCA programming is one way School Councils can support the work of the Alberta Schools' Association and build capacity within their School Councils.
- 11 courses available throughout the school year on the ASCA website: The Work of School Council: It's not about the Meeting, Creating School Council Plans and Building Positive Relationships are examples of the programming that is available to School Councils and their membership
- The cost of Level 1 training is \$200.00, Level 2 training is \$300.00 and early registrations in the workshops are recommended. Please check the website at www.albertaschoolcouncils.ca for more information on training dates and availability
- Last year, School Councils used their funds for presentations: both in person speakers and presentations via zoom; internet safety, adding books to parent libraries and ASCA workshops
- Each School Council can choose which learning opportunity best suits their needs and can also join with other School Councils to use funds to support larger presentations or speakers





2001 to 2021 91 % more students



RVS students are currently learning in schools that are at or near full utilization – and this situation will only get worse.

## Airdrie Schools - Sept 2022 Update

- Sept 29, 2022 12,405 students
- Building capacity 13,455 students
- Added 839 students in the 17 facilities over the past year
- Utilization rate across all RVS Airdrie schools as of Sept 29, 2022 = 92%
- Examples of schools facing significant utilization pressure:
  - Herons Crossing School 101%
  - Northcott Prairie School 103%
  - Meadowbrook School 115%
  - George McDougall High School 102%
  - Bert Church High School 99%
  - W.H. Croxford High School 109%

# Cochrane Schools - Sept 2022 Update

- Sept 29, 2022 5,612 students
- Building capacity 5,839 students
- Added 301 students in the 8 facilities over the past year
- Utilization rate across all RVS Cochrane schools as of Sept 29, 2022 = 97% (92% if you add Bearspaw and Westbrook)
- Examples of schools facing significant utilization pressure:
  - Manachaban School 109%
  - Mitford / Cochrane Christian Academy 108%
  - Fireside 98%
  - Bow Valley High School 102%
  - Cochrane High School 105%

## Chestermere & Area Schools – Sept 2022 Update

- Sept 29, 2022 4,931 students
- Building capacity 5,300 students
- Added 387 students in the 5 Chestermere facilities over the past year (note: many former Prince of Peace resident students moved to other Chestermere schools)
- Utilization rate across all RVS Chestermere and Area schools as of Sept 29, 2022 = 92% (96% if you exclude Indus and Langdon schools)
- Examples of schools facing significant utilization pressure:
  - East Lake 93%
  - Prairie Waters 95%
  - Chestermere High 97%
  - Chestermere Lake Middle 110%


